ICOFOM Conference

Qatar Museums, ICOM Qatar (The International Council of Museums' national committee for Qatar), the ICOM-Arab Regional Alliance, and the International Committee for Museology (ICOFOM) cordially organized the three-day international conference on the topic "Future of Museums and Museology Practices in a Changing World". The conference took place on the 1st until the 3rd of December 2024 at the Museum of Islamic Art in Qatar. The conference hosted a total of 257 participants from all across the globe and from various national and international organizations.

This gathering in Qatar aimed to promote a sustainable museum sector in a changing world, highlighting the shared challenges and solutions across the Arab region and beyond. The conference strived to better prepare museums for a shared sustainable future based on the United Nations Agenda 2030 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

At a time of shared international challenges and global turmoil, the museum community around the world shares a common desire: to safeguard cultural and natural heritage and build a better future for our world and younger generations. This conference aimed to highlight the ways in which young people who represent our communities and our countries' future can and should be involved in the discussions and decision-making processes on how to solve present-day issues and tomorrow's concerns. Young people around the world are rightly anxious about the impact of climate change and the slow progress to speed up the transition to a sustainable future, as demonstrated by the Fridays for Future movement, global youth leaders, and most recently, the call to action to museum professionals at the ICOM 26th General Conference in Prague, Czechia. There is a need for young people to become agents of change in museums, emphasizing the role that museums can play in addressing climate emergencies and the inclusion of diverse narratives. This conference provided a platform for discussing museology practice across the Arab region to empower the field and lead the transition to sustainability.

Within this framework, it is essential to expand, deepen, and increase discussions on museology, how we curate, and how we examine and teach museology in our universities and the education sector. Adaptation, innovation, and meeting the demands of changing audiences will require delving into new research and exploration of critical issues, including the use of new technologies such as artificial intelligence, co-curation, balancing historical perspectives and sociological understandings, sharing intergenerational knowledge, and pursue historical and contemporary cultural readings as well natural and cultural preservation globally.



Setting the Tone

Global Visions for the Future of Museology

The conference opened with a thought-provoking panel discussion titled "The Future of Museology in a Changing World," chaired by Prof. Karen Brown, Chair of ICOFOM. This high-level panel brought together distinguished voices from across the globe, each offering unique regional insights and expertise on the evolving role of museums.

Panellists included:

- Abdulla Yousuf Al Mulla Director of the 3-2-1 Qatar Olympic and Sports Museum

Setting the Tone

Global Visions for the Future of Museology

Each speaker provided compelling perspectives on how museums can engage with the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to shape a more inclusive, responsive, and sustainable future. Their interventions sparked a robust panel discussion on global challenges and regional strategies—examining points of convergence, divergence, and emerging solutions.

The session offered a broad and critical reflection on sustainability, exploring concepts like growth, limits to growth, and environmental tipping points. In light of the climate emergency and other pressing transitions, panelists also shared real-world examples of how museums are actively collaborating with their communities to navigate change and reimagine their futures.



Advancing Museums Through Good Practice

Session II: The Future of Museums Through Good Practice, featured six parallel tracks of 15-minute presentations moderated by experts across various venues.



Session 2A, moderated by **Dr. Rashid Malheya**, highlighted forward-thinking initiatives such as AlUla's future-oriented strategies presented by Candida Pestana and Maissa Abou Rahal, climate museums as agents of change by Dr. B. George Jacob, and transnational pedagogies in museum education by Dr. Sarina Wakefield. Additional presentations explored the role of crafts in museology, innovative business models for private museums in Saudi Arabia, and sustainability strategies shared by Javier Jimenez of Lord Cultural Resources.

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Advancing Museums Through Good Practice





Session 2B, moderated by **Sharoq Hussain Hassan**, featured a variety of case studies including Noam Alon's examination of the Arab world's representation in European art, Ashraf Abo-Elyazied's presentation on museum education's role in preserving intangible heritage, and Nicolás Rojas Inostroza's virtual talk on Chile's "free entry" museum model. Other topics included the curation of traditional Arab costumes and the environmental impact of CSR practices in Italian museums.

Advancing Museums Through Good Practice

Session 2C, led by **Shamma Mohammed Al Mazrouei**, delved into academic and virtual innovations. Presentations addressed the future of university museums in Bangladesh, the sustainability of museology in the Arab region, and a virtual contribution from Nicola Urbino on CSR strategies within Italian museums. Dr. Ech-Cherki Dahmali also offered valuable insights on the future direction of Arab museology.



After a brief comfort break, the afternoon continued with Sessions 2D, 2E, and 2F, each offering deeper explorations of good practices in museology. Session 2D, moderated by **Abdullatif Al Jasmi**, featured topics such as upskilling heritage professionals, technological enhancements in accessibility, and the role of cultural spaces in building sustainable futures. Notable reflections were shared by Nargiz Abdullayeva and Dr. Hesperia Iliadou-Suppiej, alongside case studies on intergenerational knowledge-sharing and ecosystem-based learning models.

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Advancing Museums Through Good Practice

In Session 2E, moderated by **Abdulla Yousuf Al Mulla**, speakers explored forward-looking ideas including soft-skills learning in museums, case studies from regional Austria, and Alpine approaches to future-oriented museology. Meanwhile, Session 2F, led again by Sharoq Hussain Hassan, focused on sustainability and community engagement. Presentations covered the museum's role in raising local awareness, the re-curation of Qatar's intangible heritage, and creative strategies for collection care.



Complementing the in-person sessions were virtual presentations from around the globe, emphasizing the conference's truly international scope. These contributions touched on digital co-curation, audience engagement through artistic outreach, and inclusive, tech-enabled storytelling—highlighting the diverse and innovative ways museums are adapting to an ever-evolving world.

To close the day on a high note, participants were treated to an exclusive guided tour of "Splendours of the Atlas: A Voyage Through Morocco's Heritage" at the Museum of Islamic Art. Featuring treasured collections from both Morocco and Qatar, the showcase transported visitors on a cultural journey across the Moroccan landscape, inspiring deep appreciation for the intricate beauty and enduring legacy of Morocco's Islamic art and heritage.








SECOND DAY

2nd of December 2024

Day Two kicked off with "The Future of Museums Through Resilience and Accessibility," featuring four dynamic sessions that sparked powerful conversations and fresh perspectives.

Session 3A moderated by

Abdulrahman Al Korbi showcased a rich tapestry of presentations highlighting diverse approaches to resilience, accessibility, and sustainability in museums. Dr. Sinan Abd Younis (Qatar Museums, Qatar) opened with a striking case study on the 2014 Mosul crisis, examining its impact on heritage preservation. Annissa Maulina Gultom (Ras Al Khaimah Department of Antiquities and Museums, UAE) shared her experience with co-curation models to strengthen Khaleeji museology in multinational contexts. Mai Khaled Amer (Helwan University, Egypt) presented accessibility enhancement strategies, using the Kafr El Sheikh Museum as a local example. Sakshi Jain (University of Glasgow, UK) highlighted Arna Jharna, where folk traditions intersect with sustainable living.

Session 3B moderated by **Abdullatif Al Jasmi** brought together insightful perspectives where Najah Raniyah and Salsabilla Sakinah (Museum Bank Indonesia & Cardiff University, UK) evaluated the SDGs integration within Indonesian museums, stressing the need to bridge policy and practice. Manvi Seth (Indian Institute of Heritage, India) emphasized foundational museological principles for building institutional excellence. Ferass Al Tubi (Bait Al Zubair Foundation, Oman) discussed the role of integrated cultural institutions (virtual). Lidia Abenavoli (Sapienza Università di Roma, Italy) concluded with an inspiring virtual presentation on the museum's role in driving resilience, accessibility, and sustainability.

SECOND DAY

2nd of December 2024

After a quick refresh and recharge, delegates dove back in with Parallel Sessions 3C and 3D, each packed with fresh ideas, bold perspectives, and global voices shaping the future of museology.



Session 3C moderated by **Khulood Al Fahad** featured a compelling lineup of presentations including Bouthayna M. Baltaji (Qatar Museums, Qatar) shared impactful case studies on fostering social and environmental resilience at the National Museum of Qatar. Mohamadou Moustapha DIEYE (ICOM Sénégal) examined sustainable development practices in African museums, with a focus on the IFAN Museum of African Art. Dr. Dyotana Banerjee and Sejal Rathwa (Krea University, India) delved into the spatial politics of museological practices in Dalit and Tribal community museums in Gujarat.

SECOND DAY

2nd of December 2024

Session 3D moderated by Khalifa Al Obaidli offered a range of diverse speakers, joining virtually was Vanessa Ferey (Université Laval, Canada; Sorbonne Nouvelle, France) offered insights into museology's evolving role in the Symbiocene epoch. Elena Corradini and her team (University of Modena, Italy) explored the therapeutic potential of heritage in fostering well-being and intergenerational dialogue. Finally, Sukanya Sharma (Jindal Global University, India) reimagined visitor engagement through the lens of the Maharaja Ranjit Singh Summer Palace Museum.

Session IV launched into a series of parallel thematic workshops, each offering hands-on, forward-thinking approaches to shaping the future of museums.



SECOND DAY

2nd of December 2024

Workshop 4A, moderated by **Noof Mohammed** and facilitated by **Jamie Allan Brown** (University of St Andrews, UK), centered on "Young People Shaping the Future of Museology through the Lens of the SDGs." The session underscored the vital role of youth as change-makers, particularly in tackling climate challenges and driving sustainability in underrepresented communities.

Workshop 4B, moderated by **Jack Taylor**, invited participants to imagine bold futures in "New Models: Imagining and Innovating Gulf Museum Futures." Facilitated by Erin Fleming (Qatar Museums), and featuring panelists Aebhric Coleman (Lusail Museum), Alia Saeed Al Shamsi (Louvre Abu Dhabi), and Manal Al Majed (NEOM Museum Consultant), this visionary session explored the intersection of museums, digitization, Al, and smart cities.

2nd of December 2024

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Workshop 4C, led by moderator **Shamma Al Mazrouei** and facilitated by Abeer Taher Albahrani (Saudi Arabia), highlighted the power of creative learning in museums. Participants explored interactive strategies for engaging audiences and building meaningful cultural connections through storytelling and experiential design.

The energy continued with Workshop 4D, moderated by **Shaikha Al Nasr**, which spotlighted "Empowering Museums in the Gulf." Drawing on best practices from the Museum of Islamic Art (MIA), facilitators Mounia Chekhab Abudaya, Shaika Nasser Al-Nassr, Marc Pelletreau, Anwar Efaifa, and Lolwa Al Solaiti (Qatar Museums) shared innovative approaches to curation, education, and community engagement.

In Workshop 4E, moderated by **Sharoq Hussain Hassan** and **Sheikha Maryam Al Thani,** creativity took center stage with a unique LEGO® Serious Play® session, facilitated by Elisa Grimaldi and Qatar Museums' Internal Strategic Communication Team. Participants used LEGO bricks to build their visions for the museum of the future, sparking meaningful dialogue and imaginative thinking.

Workshop 4F, moderated by **Shamma Al Mazrouei** and **Abdulrahman Al Korbi**, was led by the Museum of Oman Across Ages team. This important workshop focused on accessibility and inclusivity, offering practical strategies to ensure museums welcome and reflect the needs of all audiences, regardless of ability or background.

Exploring Tomorrow

Museums, Technology, and Innovation

The final day of the conference opened with a forward-looking focus on "The Future of Museums Through Technology and Innovation," delivered across three dynamic parallel sessions: 5A, 5B, and 5C.

Session 5A moderated by Sheikha Maryam Al Thani, while Abdulrahman Al Korbi and Shamma Al Mazrouei led Sessions 5B and 5C, respectively. Standout presentations included Dr. Bakr bin Mohammed Barnawi (King Saud University, Saudi Arabia), who explored the evolving role of museology in Saudi academic institutions. Roda Al Thani (Qatar Museums) captivated the audience with "Animating Tradition: Adapting Qatari Folklore for the Digital Era," highlighting innovative storytelling through digital media.

Also among the highlights were cutting-edge digital projects such as "Virtual Reality and Digital Display for Documenting Traditional Iraqi Costumes" presented by Omar Qasim Khalil Al-Rawi and Faten Mashaallah Hamed Al-Zaidawi (Iraq), and a compelling analysis of digital sustainability in Portuguese museums by Leonor Amaral (University of Porto, Portugal).

These sessions set the tone for a day dedicated to reimagining the museum experience through emerging technologies, digital innovation, and creative adaptation.

After a brief comfort break, Session V resumed with parallel sessions 5D, 5E, and 5F, each offering rich insights into the intersection of technology and museology. Session 5D, moderated by **Noof** Mohammed, featured standout presentations from Tooba Aziz and Amal Rabia Nazir (Qatar Museums), who showcased the use of Al and machine learning to manage and enhance large photographic collections. 


